The Agricultural Wages Board protects pay and conditions for 150,000 vulnerable rural workers, including many thousands in the South West.

In year 2000 the MP for Frome and Somerton David Heath signed an Early Day Motion in the House of Commons in support of the Agricultural Wages Board. Now, as Farm Minister, he is leading the charge to abolish this vital safety net for thousands of rural workers and their families.

Petition against the closure of Dorset Enterprises

The Dorset Enterprises factory has been providing supported employment for people with disabilities in the Borough since 1914, making garden furniture.

Bournemouth Borough Council are set to close the factory in a matter of weeks putting 22 people out of work, most of whom have a disability.

Unison is calling on councillors to vote against the recommendation to close the factory and instead explore additional options to return the factory to break-even status including finding a suitable business partner.

Public sector prisons not private sector profit

The Government has announced the closure of seven public sector prisons including HM Gloucester and also HMP Shepton Mallet.

Unions believe the plans will increase overcrowding in prisons and harm offenders' family ties, making rehabilitation of offenders more difficult. Travelling time and cost for both professional and personal prison visitors will be increased.

The closures will hurt the local economy costing hundreds of skilled, good quality jobs.

The closures represent further privatisation by stealth as the number of prisoners housed in private prisons will increase as the public prisons decrease. Private prisons are exempt from closure and make considerable monies via overcrowding. New prisoner places being created are mainly in private prisons.

PCS is calling for an independent review into the impact of privatisation across the Prison Service and has launched a petition in support www.pcs.org.uk/prisonspetition

Michael Foot memorial in Plymouth

Michael Foot was a towering figure in British politics. Born in Plymouth in 1913, he was elected MP for Plymouth Devonport in 1945 and later as the MP for Ebbw Vale in 1960 until 1992. After a distinguished Parliamentary career, he became Leader of the Labour Party in 1980. Michael is remembered in Plymouth not only as one of its city's most popular MPs, a trade unionist and a successful journalist but also as a loyal and high-profile supporter of Plymouth Argyle. Right up until his death in 2010 Michael remained an ardent supporter of the City of Plymouth, its football team and its people.

Damaged skin points to missing gloves

A mechanical engineer developed a painful skin condition when he was exposed to chemicals at work. The 59-year-old Unite member from Plymouth, whose name has not been released, developed dermatitis after he was exposed to several different chemicals in his role as an engineer for Camtec Engineering Ltd. He was not provided with suitable gloves and as a result his hands became covered in the liquids.

He first began to notice problems with his hands in 2009 and was told by his GP that he was suffering from occupational dermatitis. He was provided with creams but his hands continued to be painful and cracked. It was another six months before his employer took his condition seriously and provided him with protective gloves.

Faced with a union-backed compensation claim, Camtec Engineering admitted liability and settled the claim out of court for £13,500. Terry Keefe, regional co-ordinating officer from Unite, commented: "Our member has been exposed to irritants that caused this painful condition through no fault of his own. Protective equipment, in this case gloves, avoid this type of condition from developing but the employer failed to even do that."
