# My job *will* change because of climate change – or the changes required to deal with it

- 1 in 10 UK jobs are in occupations likely to shrink because of climate change and climate action
- 1 in 10 UK jobs are in occupations likely to experience growing demand because of climate change and climate action
- But every job will change!

# Change - because climate crisis is already affecting us at work



- 80% of teachers face classroom overheating this July
- Floods in 2013-2014 were the biggest deployment of the fire and rescue services in history: 7,000 incidents and 2,000 rescues
- What are the ways that climate change is already affecting people in your workplace?

# Change - because our workplaces produce emissions

- Some things need to change because they make carbon emissions - e.g. cars - but you might get workplace benefit as a result
- Some things need to change because industries won't work the same way in 15 years' time - e.g. green steel
- What are the biggest changes that need to be made in your workplace?
