The agenda for the first meeting of the TUC in 1868 included technical education and the 'limitation of apprenticeships' which we assume meant the proper regulation of them.

To celebrate this landmark Unionlearn with the TUC are hosting an event at the historic Mechanics Institute. The event will celebrate apprenticeships past, present and future.



Guest speakers include the Mayor of Greater Manchester Andy Burnham, who will talk about skills we need now and those we need in the future.

Mary Sayer, who is responsible for the Unite in schools programme will explain how helping pupils understand the importance of how a collective approach can solve issues.

The activities will include a visit by school children from a local school, who will help celebrate our history and a number of short videos on apprenticeship support.

#### **Manchester Histories Festival TUC Day**

The day includes films and tours and culminates in an event featuring **Frances O Grady in Conversation with DJ Dave Haslam** 

As part of Manchester Histories Festival 2018 and marking the 150th anniversary of the first Trades Union Congress (TUC) in Manchester and Salford in 1868, DJ/writer Dave Haslam will be interviewing the TUC's current General Secretary, Frances O'Grady.

The world of work is in crisis. Expect discussion on the current challenges (trade union membership has halved since the 1970s), and the potential role of trades unions in a contemporary landscape of zero hours, job insecurity, Brexit, deregulation, low pay, and the gig economy. This is also an opportunity to discuss what we can learn from radical, labour, and Manchester history. In addition, we'll gain



an insight into Frances O'Grady's ideas and inspirations, and discover more of her personal journey; from joining the Labour party aged 15, memories of her time studying at the University of Manchester, and her thoughts on being the first woman in the role of General Secretary.

Doors at 7pm, the event starts 7.30pm, with an approximate running time of one hour (including plenty of time for audience questions).

'For me, trade unionism isn't a career - it's a cause' Frances O'Grady, the first female General Secretary of the TUC on being on the Woman's Hour Power List.
