

NOW IRAQI TRADE UNIONISTS ARE ON THEIR WAY BACK

FOR DECADES, IRAQI TRADE UNIONISTS HAVE SUFFERED FOR THEIR BELIEFS

People such as political researcher Bakar Hussein (right) spent years in Saddam Hussein's jails simply for belonging to a trade union. "I'd pass out because the pain of torture was so great," he recalls. "I'd be taken down, unconscious, and thrown back into my cell. I didn't expect to live." His story is all too common.



BUT THE PICTURE IS CHANGING

British trade unionists have visited union leaders representing over a million workers in Iraq and Iraqi Kurdistan. They are struggling to build independent trade unions so they can take their place in Iraq's emerging society.

But their efforts are being thwarted by Saddam's laws banning unions in the public sector, and Decree 8750, passed by Iraq's government last year, which gave the government power to "take control of all monies belonging to trade unions and prevent them from dispensing any such monies".

With no bank accounts, unions cannot capitalise on a growing membership because they cannot organise or communicate with members. They have appealed for help with basic running costs – such as printing **Workers' Unity**, the newspaper of the General Federation of Iraqi Workers (the Iraqi TUC).
