Welcome

In this edition of the TUC cuts bulletin, we mainly concentrate on arrangements for the March 26th March for the alternative.



March for the Alternative

The March for the Alternative will be the TUC's biggest event for many years.

We are making good progress with organising the logistics for the day, but are not yet in a position to answer all the questions about the event, not least because some of them depend on other agencies.

But we will do our best to answer the most frequent questions that we are already getting. And while we hope everything here is accurate, our plans need to be flexible so there may be changes.

Assembly

The event will gather on Victoria Embankment and form up between Waterloo and Blackfriars Bridges from 11am.

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It will start moving off around noon, but because of the likely size the last marchers will not be leaving until after two, and possibly later.

Organisation of the march

We are working on a plan for the march line-up. People coming may want to march with their union or with the group they have travelled with, and we want to make sure that people who have trains and coaches booked can complete the march in time to get back to the right station. We will therefore be working an on assembly plan that tries to meet both these requirements.

The front of march party will consist of rally speakers and a specially invited representative group of those affected by the cuts or involved in campaigning.

We will not allow vehicles into the march as they could impede the passage of emergency vehicles and pose their own safety issues.

But we are keen to break the march up with marching bands. We will be arranging some of these through the TUC, but we would welcome other unions or organisations bringing or sponsoring bands, though please tell us in advance.

We are still working out the best way of helping those with mobility problems participate in the day.

There will be TUC flags available for marchers. Other unions and organisations will naturally produce material for their members and supporters.

But we would strongly discourage traditional placards. Flags are easier to distribute and people are more likely to take them home with them afterwards, rather than leave them as litter. Not only is this unsightly and bad for the environment, the TUC has to pay for rubbish disposal.

We find people prefer flags as they are lighter, and more suitable for children than heavy placards. They also help the march present a positive colourful image.

The route

Here is a Google map of the route <u>http://bit.ly/mar26route</u>. The march will enter Hyde Park from the bottom at Hyde Park Corner (often marches enter from the top at Marble Arch/Speakers' Corner.

Some people have asked us whether it's possible to join or leave the march along the route. While we would discourage organised groups joining the march at places other than the assembly point, there will be nothing to stop individuals or family groups

Stewarding

Good stewarding will be an important part of making this a safe, family-friendly day out.

The TUC is directly recruiting some 2-300 senior stewards who will undergo a day's training before the event. We will also be employing professional stewards for some parts of the event.

But we are also looking for hundreds of volunteers to be what we are calling route stewards.

People often worry that being a steward means having to deal with trouble-makers. This is not the role of route stewards. The job is rather about keeping the march moving and knowing what to do if issues arise such as a lost child or if someone is injured or taken ill. There will be senior stewards all along the route of the march, and other ways of reporting issues to march organisers. Route stewards coming with an organised group of marchers can stay in the section of the march with their group.

We are also asking every group travelling together to the march to nominate a travel steward. This role can be easily combined with being a route steward, but does not have to be. Travel stewards are there to assist with the travel arrangements for their group. We would ask them to supply contact details so that we can provide pre-march briefings and any necessary updates via SMS text on the day.

To support this TUC Education will be offering training sessions in the South West for volunteers who are interested in being Travel or Route Stewards on the day.

The rally

The march will arrive in Hyde Park shortly after 1:15pm with the rally starting around 1:30pm.

Because we expect large numbers we estimate that people will still be arriving in the Park at 4pm – and possibly later. We will therefore keep the rally running until around 4:30pm. Not everyone who arrives early will want to stay through to the end – and indeed we hope that early arrivals will move to allow those coming later a good view. We will therefore break the rally up into a number of segments.

We are not in a position to announce the speakers yet, but we are working on a list made up of union leaders, front-line public service workers, representatives of other organisations and groups opposed to the cuts. We also hope for some star quality.

The licensing conditions for an event of this type prevent us featuring a significant amount of musical performance, but we hope to be able to arrange some short musical interludes during the rally.

There will be a giant screen so that we can show campaign videos such as those produced by False Economy and the Robin Hood Tax campaigns. We will also be soon launching a video competition for a 60 second ad about the cuts – and will show the winners. We may also gather video messages from prominent supporters who can't be there. In the Park

There will be refreshment facilities and extra toilets. There are good public toilets in Trafalgar Square along the route too.

While we will have a welfare tent for lost children, first aid etc it is not possible to have a tent village in Hyde Park, but we do expect to be able to offer TUC-affiliated unions only a trestle table as a contact point with their members.

Transport

The most challenging aspect of the event is going to be getting everyone there and home again afterwards.

Unfortunately the idea of a special charter train from Cornwall has not proved possible. There are track maintenance works on this line so delays may occur on scheduled services.

Unions, trades union councils and other groups are organising coaches and we will be setting up a seat-brokering service for coaches using the False Economy website

www.falseeconomy.org.uk as it has a built in mapping function. This will allow people to advertise spare seats or say that they are looking for transport. There will be good links from the TUC web site.

We are still working on plans for coach drop-offs and pick-ups, but it is likely that some of this may have to be done outside central London with marchers making their way by public transport as there simply won't be enough capacity in central London to handle all the coaches that are expected.

We will need therefore to be in contact with every coach that is coming to London.

Some people will no doubt want to come by car, even though we would prefer that they don't.

Don't even think about parking in central London. Instead you should aim for the edge of London and complete your journey by public transport – and please fill your car.

The TUC is not organising any transport directly.
