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South West TUC Annual Conference

Richard and Rosie elected

Richard Capps has been re-elected chair of the South West TUC. The PCS member from Weston-super-Mare, elected unopposed at the South TUC's AGM in Croyde Bay on Saturday, will be joined on the top table by Rosie McGregor, a UNISON member of the White Horse Trades Union Council in West Wiltshire.

More than 100 delegates and guests attended the event, where they heard about the impact of the government's austerity agenda on jobs in the region, how welfare reforms would affect benefit claimants (most of whom were in work), and about the scandal of low-pay in the domiciliary care sector.

TUC president Lesley Mercer launched a stinging attack on the "demolition" government, saying: "We're up against arguably the most right-wing government Britain has ever had, cutting and privatising the services we all rely on.

"It is attacking our jobs, our rights, and our living standards, and it is unleashing a tide of economic destruction unseen in this country since the 1930s."

The solution, she said, is to build social housing and properly invest in business.

She said: "We must make the case for a new economy. Our task isn't just to show there is an alternative to austerity, but to set out a vision of a fairer, stronger, more sustainable economy for the long term.

"We want an economy driven not by spiralling debt, but by decent wages, shaped not by the interests of banks and big business, but by ordinary people, and an economy based not on financial and property speculation, but on investment, exports and world-class manufacturing."

Sian Moore from the University of the West of England told the conference 80% of care workers employed by private providers were on zero-hours contracts, meaning they were paid only when there was work available.

She said this meant they were not paid between visits – a particular problem in the rural South West, where journeys between clients could last longer than the visit itself – and their hours varied from week to week, with no guaranteed work.

Delegates also debated motions on facility time, the future of the Crown Post Office network and public transport.

Farewell to Helen Cole

Helen Cole, South West unionlearn Regional Manager informed the South West TUC Annual Conference that the Government has made last-minute cuts to the unionlearn budget. As a consequence the TUC has been forced to cut a layer of management and she has taken redundancy. Tributes to Helen's work for union learning were paid and Nigel Costley, South West TUC Regional Secretary, presented her with a bouquet.

Average earnings down

The average worker in the South West has suffered a 6% drop in their weekly earnings, since the coalition came to power, according to new figures from the South West TUC.

The research shows the real-time pay cut is due partly to wages failing to keep up with inflation, and partly because well-paid jobs are being replaced by lower-wage ones, many of which are part-time.

Time to change course

Speaking in Bournemouth TUC General Secretary Frances O'Grady said that despite recent International Monetary Fund (IMF) criticism of the government's austerity economics, the Chancellor is showing no sign of changing course.

But government economic policies are making the UK's problems worse and allowing the government to use austerity as an excuse to implement policies that no-one has voted for.

Speaking to the CWU conference, Frances O'Grady she said: "Spending cuts, unemployment and austerity look more and more like hard right politics, rather than necessary economics.

"Even the IMF now says that the UK should ease up. This comes after IMF research showing that spending cuts make deficits worse when an economy is depressed. They may reduce spending, but if they suck the life out of an economy then the tax take falls even more.

"Remember – this government originally said they would have reduced borrowing to £37 billion a year by 2014. Now they say it will be more than £100 billion.

"Of course big national debts are a problem. It is right to want to reduce the deficit. It has always been the case that this government was trying to move too quickly.

"Slash away at support for some of the most vulnerable in society, rather than create the jobs that will get the unemployed back to work.

"We should be building a new economy that can provide the jobs, security and living standards that can give us a decent future.

"Instead we are simply getting an increased dose of the policies that caused the damage in the first place. That is why we must change course – and change course fast."

Fill Bristol Cathedral with trade union banners

Builders and electricians who were members of trade unions were banned from taking part in the building of Cabot Circus in the centre of Bristol, it has emerged.

The director of construction giant McAlpine has admitted that before employing workers on the site, the firm ran all job applications past the Consulting Association, owners of the illegal "blacklist". The blacklist contains the names of at least 3,000 trade union members, health and safety reps and others, including one charitable person who was collecting signatures for a homelessness petition.

Employers would use the list to root out "trouble-makers", devastating workers' lives as they were unable to find employment in the industry ever again.

Callum McAlpine made the admission earlier this year when he appeared before the House of Commons Scottish Select Affairs Committee.

The negative effect blacklisting has on health and safety in the workplace will feature in the South West TUC's historic event to commemorate Workers' Memorial Day in Bristol on Sunday.

The event, held in Bristol Cathedral from 1 to 2pm, will serve to remember those who have been killed or injured during the course of their work, and to campaign for better health and safety laws in the workplace.

Speakers at the event include Dave Smith from the Blacklist Support Group, NUJ general secretary Michelle Stanistreet, Julia Verne from the South West Public Health Observatory, Farzana Saker from Bristol Multi-Faith Forum and Canon Tim Higgins.

The BBC's Sally Challoner will interview the families of people who have died as a result of their work, and hear from a trade union official about how the government's loosening of health and safety laws is imperilling workers.

Nigel Costley said: "We'll probably never know how many Bristol workers – and their families – have suffered as a result of the blacklist.

"It is astonishing to think that honest workers in this city have been refused work simply because they blew the whistle on health and safety concerns.

"The government takes a dim view of health and safety, taking every opportunity to cut red tape, allowing employers to cut corners and take risks with their employee's safety."

Latest figures from the Health and Safety Executive (HSE) show sixteen people in the South West died because of their work between 2011 and 2012, with 4,230 workers being injured during the same period.

EDF scales back Hinkley preparations

Energy firm EDF is to scale back on preparatory work for the Hinkley Point new nuclear plant and reduce the number of people working on it in a bid to control costs.

Prospect National Secretary Alan Leighton said: "Our members fear that any delay in the preparation work could impede or delay EDF's ability to bring the project to fruition once agreement has been reached. The union has called on all parties involved in negotiations on setting a strike price for electricity generated by the planned new nuclear power plant to redouble their efforts and secure an agreement.

The Stop Hinkley Campaign believes that the lay-offs are a sign that the project could be on the verge of collapse. Theo Simon of the Stop Hinkley campaign said, "There is a growing tide of challenges now being raised against the new nuclear plant - including doubts over its radioactive waste plan, EU competition laws, lack of adequate investment and the continued failure to reach agreement over fixing our future electricity prices in advance - so it's not surprising that EDF are ready to cut their losses and run. But it will of course be a blow to the people in West Somerset who have pinned their hopes on EDFs promises of jobs and prosperity for all".

MoD workers campaign to save Ashchurch jobs

Last month Armed Forces Minister Andrew Robathan put 350 jobs under threat at MOD Ashchurch, near Twkesbury, when he announced the army will be withdrawing from the defence base and the site would be sold off as location for 2,000 new homes.

Martin Hird, GMB Senior Organiser, said "The closure of MOD Ashchurch will result in a loss of over 350 highly skilled jobs and have a wider impact on the local economy.

"It is the largest employer in north Gloucestershire and the local council has agreed to join the fight to save it. GMB welcome this support of Tewkesbury Borough Council in the fight to keep MOD Ashchurch open and thank all the councillors who voted in support."

Cutting fuel bills through Energy Best Deal

Unionlearn has linked up with the Citizens Advice to deliver Energy Best Deal sessions into workplaces across the South West. So far we have worked with Babcock Marine in Appledore, Yeovil Colleges Fresh Start Job Club in Bridport and Unison Healthcare in Dorchester, with more workshops in the pipeline.

At a time of rocketing energy costs the sessions can help save money and cut energy usage. Though aimed mainly at low income consumers and front-line staff who work with people at risk of fuel poverty they are very useful for ULRs and reps who support colleagues at work. The sessions look at sign-posting people to a range of further help with issues such as fuel debt, benefits entitlement and energy efficiency. Sessions are based around a one hour presentation, with an information leaflet to hand out. The campaign aims to:

make people aware of the savings that can be made by switching fuel providers or negotiating with existing providers provide information about help available from energy suppliers and government for people struggling to pay their gas and electricity bills inform consumers about how they might save money by using less energy and sources of advice and help around energy efficiency.

South West young MPs

They are researching and learning about those who have campaigned for change throughout our history, such as the suffragettes and Tolpuddle Martyrs. The South West TUC are supporting the project and Regional Secretary Nigel Costley came to speak about Tolpuddle and the China Clay strike and explore how young people might try and resolve issues in the workplace today.

Matt Currie, MYP for Plymouth said "It is a very interesting project and by looking at how others have stood out and made their voice heard, it has inspired many of us to take more of an active role within our communities and to act as an advocate for the young people that we represent, ensuring that their voice is made ever stronger."

That evening MYPs were invited to dress up as their chosen heritage hero and Nigel was amongst the panel who had the unenviable task of choosing the winner. Natasha Glendening, MYP for Dorset, won for coming as her hero, Indira Gandhi.

"I really love Indian Culture and History and it seemed to be fitting to choose a Hero from where some of my family come from. Indira Gandhi was a female Prime Minister of India, that in itself anywhere in the world is an accomplishment and I really admire her determination for success. In the western world we pride ourselves in having come so far with women's suffrage and civil rights, however Indira Gandhi is a prime example of how much we underestimate other parts of the world."

Historic court and cells will make Dorchester proud

Dorchester's Shire Hall and the old court where the Tolpuddle Martyrs were tried looks set to become an internationally important heritage centre after winning lottery support.

The Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) has given its initial support towards a project which should see the Grade I listed building transformed into a major visitor centre with high quality exhibitions and educational resources.

Author Thomas Hardy sat there as a magistrate and time has stood still at the court, which appears today almost as it did in Georgian times.

Robert Gould, Leader of West Dorset District Council, said: "I am thrilled that we have succeeded in winning this money from the Heritage Lottery Fund. This is on top of the £1million that the district council has pledged to make this exciting project a reality.

"The Shire Hall is a fascinating building with a unique and special history. Visitors will be able to tread in the footsteps of the Tolpuddle Martyrs and see the very same sights that would have greeted them.

Under the plans, the new heritage centre could be run by the Dorset County Museum. Local people will be asked for their views. Consultations are also ongoing with other interested groups including the TUC who once owned the court.
